



## Fraxinus sieboldiana



<b>Height</b>	8-10 m
<b>Width</b>	8-10m
<b>Crown</b>	broad ovoid, dark, dense crown
<b>Bark and branches</b>	grey
<b>Leaf</b>	green, feathered leaf
<b>Flowers</b>	white, flowers in May
<b>Fruits</b>	brown
<b>Spines/thorns</b>	None
<b>Toxicity</b>	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
<b>Soil type</b>	clayed soil, loamy soil, sandy soil, calcareous soil
<b>Soil moisture</b>	suitable for dry soil
<b>Paving</b>	tolerates partial paving
<b>Winter hardiness zone</b>	6b (-20,5 to -17,8 °C)
<b>Wind resistance</b>	good
<b>Other resistances</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind, resistant to de-icing salt
<b>Application</b>	industrial areas
<b>Shape</b>	clearstem tree, multi-stem treem
<b>Synonyms</b>	Fraxinus mariesii

Fairly slow growing, large shrub to small or medium-size tree. Rarely taller than 10 m under cultivation. The densely branching crown is a broad ovoid, often already branching at low level. The axillary and terminal panicles consist of male and female flowers. These are white and very decorative. Is closely related to *F. ornus* but differs in its denser branch pattern, smaller leaf, narrower leaf segments and the glandular hairs on bud scales, leaf stems and flower clusters. Attractive park tree, prefers somewhat drier, preferably calcareous soil and a warm, sunny position.
