



## Magnolia ×soulangeana 'Lennei'



<b>Height</b>	6-8 m
<b>Width</b>	6-8m
<b>Crown</b>	broad vase-shaped, dark, dense crown, capricious growing
<b>Bark and branches</b>	brown, grey
<b>Leaf</b>	green
<b>Flowers</b>	pinkviolet, cream white, flowers in April
<b>Fruits</b>	fruitless cultivar
<b>Spines/thorns</b>	None
<b>Toxicity</b>	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
<b>Soil type</b>	clayed soil, loamy soil, sandy soil, peaty soil, acid soil
<b>Paving</b>	tolerates partial paving
<b>Winter hardiness zone</b>	6 (-23,3 to -17,8 °C)
<b>Wind resistance</b>	good
<b>Other resistances</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind
<b>Application</b>	tree containers, roof gardens, small gardens
<b>Shape</b>	clearstem tree, multi-stem treem

Grows from a large, densely branching shrub into a small, multi-stemmed tree with a broad vase-shaped to broad ovoid crown, eventually attaining a height of about 8 m. The flowers have a wide tulip shape. The fairly wide petals are an even, warm pinkish purple on the outside and creamy white on the inside. The flowers open around mid to late April, somewhat later than other *M. soulangeana* cultivars. Was discovered in the mid-19th century in Lombardy, northern Italy, and named after the German botanist Peter Joseph Lenné. Suitable for parks and gardens.
