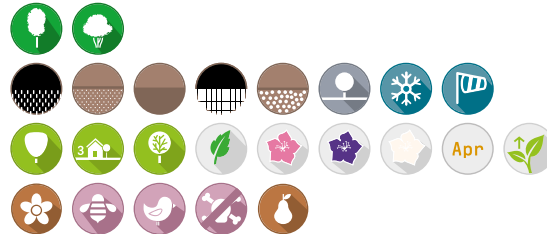




## Malus 'Adirondack'



<b>Height</b>	4 m
<b>Width</b>	2-3m
<b>Crown</b>	vase-shaped, half-open crown
<b>Bark and branches</b>	brown
<b>Leaf</b>	green
<b>Flowers</b>	voiletpink, white, light pink, flowers in April
<b>Fruits</b>	orange, red
<b>Spines/thorns</b>	None
<b>Toxicity</b>	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
<b>Soil type</b>	clayed soil, loamy soil, sandy soil, acid soil, calcareous soil
<b>Paving</b>	tolerates paving
<b>Winter hardiness zone</b>	5a (-28,8 to -26,1 °C)
<b>Wind resistance</b>	good, susceptible to sea wind
<b>Other resistances</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind
<b>Fauna tree</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind, provides food for birds
<b>Application</b>	narrow streets, tree containers, industrial areas, small gardens, patio gardens
<b>Shape</b>	clearstem tree, multi-stem treem

An ornamental apple tree as yet too little used, with a vase-shaped crown and a height of approx. 4 m. The leaves are dark green. The flowers are single, purplish-pink in bud but when open they are white with some red and have a diameter of 4 - 4.5 cm. Remarkable orange-red fruits with a diameter of approx. 1.1 cm follow in the autumn. 'Adirondack' can be used in parks, gardens and public gardens. The tree makes heavy demands on the soil as regards moisture supply and fertility. It is practically insensitive to scab and reasonably sensitive to sea wind. Winter hardiness zone: 5a
