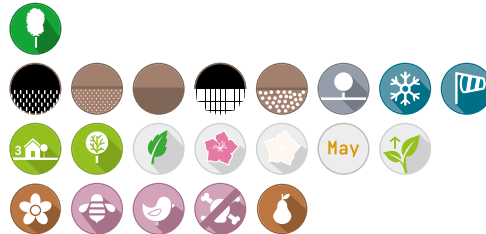




## Malus hupehensis 'Arie Mauritz'



<b>Height</b>	5-7 m
<b>Width</b>	5-7m
<b>Crown</b>	round/spherical, half-open crown
<b>Bark and branches</b>	brown, grey
<b>Leaf</b>	green
<b>Flowers</b>	pinkwhite, flowers in May
<b>Fruits</b>	red
<b>Spines/thorns</b>	None
<b>Toxicity</b>	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
<b>Soil type</b>	clayed soil, loamy soil, sandy soil, acid soil, calcareous soil
<b>Paving</b>	tolerates paving
<b>Winter hardiness zone</b>	5 (-28,8 to -23,4 °C)
<b>Wind resistance</b>	good, susceptible to sea wind
<b>Other resistances</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind
<b>Fauna tree</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind, provides food for birds
<b>Application</b>	industrial areas, small gardens, patio gardens
<b>Shape</b>	clearstem tree

Strong, small tree with a broad ovoid crown, up to about 7 m. When young, the crown has a strong, upright growth pattern, it becomes round when mature. The trunk grows to a good size. In May the pink-white flowers bloom out of light pink buds. The flowers are followed by small, shiny red crab apples. Bears abundant fruit, but this is hardly a nuisance given their small size. Healthy cultivar that is not susceptible to scab or mildew. Came out as the best crab apple in PPO Lisse's culture value survey of avenue trees. Jan P. Mauritz named the tree after his father.
