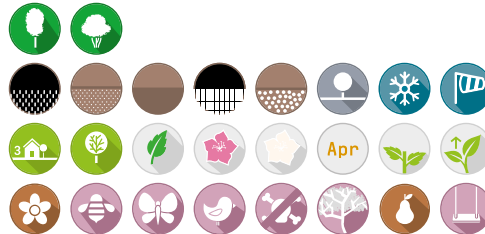




## Malus toringo



<b>Height</b>	4-5 m
<b>Width</b>	5-6m
<b>Crown</b>	round/spherical, half-open crown, capricious growing
<b>Bark and branches</b>	reddisch brown
<b>Leaf</b>	green
<b>Flowers</b>	light pink, white, flowers in April
<b>Fruits</b>	yellow, orange
<b>Spines/thorns</b>	None
<b>Toxicity</b>	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
<b>Soil type</b>	clayed soil, loamy soil, sandy soil, acid soil, calcareous soil
<b>Paving</b>	tolerates paving
<b>Winter hardiness zone</b>	5a (-28,8 to -26,1 °C)
<b>Wind resistance</b>	good, susceptible to sea wind
<b>Other resistances</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind
<b>Fauna tree</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind, provides food for birds
<b>Application</b>	narrow streets, tree containers, roof gardens, industrial areas, small gardens, patio gardens
<b>Shape</b>	clearstem tree, multi-stem treem
<b>Synonyms</b>	Malus sieboldii

Malus toringo (M. sieboldii) is a small tree that often grows in shrub form in Europe. Height 4 - 5 m with an oval to rounded crown with strongly outgrowing and overhanging branches. The glossy dark green leaves are oval to ovoid, with light green hairs on the underside and sometimes with 1 to 3 lobes. Flower buds purplish-red, flowers pale pink, fading to white. Diameter approx. 2.5 cm. The round fruits are yellow-orange. M. toringo can be used in avenues, streets and gardens and prefers nutritious soil. Winter hardiness zone: 5a
