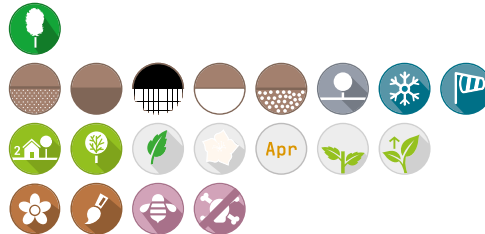




## Pyrus calleryana 'Bradford'



<b>Height</b>	10-12 m
<b>Width</b>	5-8m
<b>Crown</b>	round/spherical, half-open crown
<b>Bark and branches</b>	brown
<b>Leaf</b>	green
<b>Autumn colour</b>	red, purple
<b>Flowers</b>	white, flowers in April
<b>Fruits</b>	brown, little
<b>Spines/thorns</b>	None
<b>Toxicity</b>	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
<b>Soil type</b>	clayed soil, loamy soil, sandy soil, nutrient-poor soil, calcareous soil
<b>Paving</b>	tolerates paving
<b>Winter hardiness zone</b>	6a (-23,3 to -20,6 °C)
<b>Wind resistance</b>	good, also on the coast
<b>Other resistances</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind
<b>Fauna tree</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind, valuable for bees (honey plant)
<b>Application</b>	avenues and broad streets, tree containers, roof gardens, coastal areas, industrial areas
<b>Shape</b>	clearstem tree

An American cultivar with an ovoid crown. Later, the crown sinks and becomes round to nearly fan-shaped. Height up to approx. 12 m. The glossy, deep green leaves remain on the tree until late in the autumn and eventually turn faintly purple. Abundant white flowers in umbels. The brown fruit, measuring approx. 1 cm, does not appear very often. Suitable as a solitary tree and along avenues and streets. This tree, particularly when young, is not as winter-hardy as the cultivar 'Chanticleer'. A sheltered site is recommended. Tolerates air pollution well, like all the cultivars of *Pyrus calleryana*. Winter hardiness zone: 6a
