



## Sorbus aucuparia 'Aspleniifolia'



<b>Height</b>	8-12 m
<b>Width</b>	4-8m
<b>Crown</b>	oval, half-open crown
<b>Bark and branches</b>	grey
<b>Leaf</b>	green, feathered leaf
<b>Autumn colour</b>	yellow, orange, red
<b>Flowers</b>	white, flowers in May
<b>Fruits</b>	orange, red
<b>Spines/thorns</b>	None
<b>Toxicity</b>	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
<b>Soil type</b>	loamy soil, sandy soil, peaty soil, acid soil
<b>Soil moisture</b>	suitable for dry soil
<b>Paving</b>	tolerates no paving
<b>Winter hardiness zone</b>	4 (-34,4 to -28,9 °C)
<b>Wind resistance</b>	good
<b>Other resistances</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind
<b>Fauna tree</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind, provides food for birds
<b>Application</b>	avenues and broad streets, narrow streets, tree containers, roof gardens
<b>Shape</b>	clearstem tree, multi-stem treem

Sorbus aucuparia 'Aspleniifolia' is a cultivar distinguished from the species by its leaves that are more deeply serrated to almost separated. Some leaflets have 1 or 2 small lobes and the underside of the leaves shows a remarkably thick growth of felt-like hairs. 'Aspleniifolia' has an oval crown and reaches a height of approx. 8 - 12 m. It flowers similarly to the species and the orange-red fruits remain on the tree until well into the autumn. Winter hardiness zone: 4
