



## Tilia tomentosa 'Pendula'



<b>Height</b>	20-30 m
<b>Width</b>	10-12m
<b>Crown</b>	broad ovoid, half-open crown
<b>Bark and branches</b>	grey
<b>Leaf</b>	green, greygreen
<b>Autumn colour</b>	yellow
<b>Flowers</b>	yellow, flowers in July, fragrant flowers
<b>Fruits</b>	green, grey
<b>Spines/thorns</b>	None
<b>Toxicity</b>	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
<b>Soil type</b>	clayed soil, loamy soil, sandy soil, peaty soil, all soil types
<b>Soil moisture</b>	suitable for dry soil
<b>Paving</b>	tolerates no paving
<b>Winter hardiness zone</b>	6a (-23,3 to -20,6 °C)
<b>Wind resistance</b>	tolerates (sea) wind
<b>Other resistances</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6)
<b>Fauna tree</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), valuable for butterflies
<b>Application</b>	tree containers, roof gardens, coastal areas, industrial areas
<b>Shape</b>	clearstem tree

A tree with an ascending manner of growth with hanging lateral branches, with particularly the young, limp twigs hanging down. Height 20 - 30 m, width approx. 12 m. Very suitable as a solitary tree in parks. Young twigs are greenish grey and have felt-like hair but are soon bare and green. The leaves are more or less round, darker green than those of the species and have a remarkably thick white felty underside. The leaf stem is often twice as long as that of the species, causing the leaves to move a great deal when the wind blows. They turn yellow and remain on the tree long into the autumn. In July, aromatic flowers appear. Fairly unsusceptible to aphids. Winter hardiness zone: 6a
