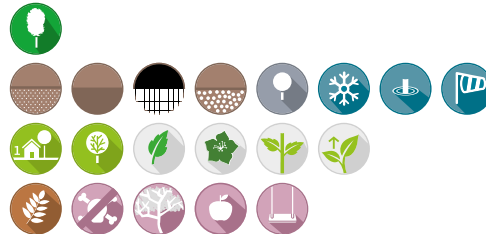




Juglans regia 'Lara'



Height	8 - 10 m
Width	6-10m
Crown	more compact than the species, 6-9 m.
Bark and branches	light grey, deeply grooved trunk, young branches grey-brown
Leaf	odd-pinnate, bright green, pinnate leaves
Flowers	walnuts, shallow grooved, green fruit husk, edible, edible fruits
Fruits	southeastern Europe, Asia Minor to the Himalayas and western China
Spines/thorns	None
Toxicity	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
Soil type	calcareous and moist soil
Soil moisture	withstand short flood
Paving	tolerates no paving
Winter hardiness zone	5b (-26,0 to -23,4 °C)
Wind resistance	goed
Other resistances	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind
Shape	clearstem tree
Origin	Al vele eeuwen in cultuur en uitgroeiend tot forse boom van circa 30 m hoogte. De vrijwel ronde kroon is opgebouwd uit zware takken. De oude stam is lichtgrijs met diepe, onregelmatige verticale groeven. Het oneven geveerde blad wordt 20 - 30 cm lang en heeft 2 - 4 (6) jukken. De deelblaadjes zijn eirond tot ovaal, circa 8 - 12 cm. Ná de bladontwikkeling verschijnen de groene, mannelijke katjes (circa 7 cm) en de kleinere vrouwelijke bloemen die in groepjes van 2 of 3 bijeen staan. De groene, bijna ronde, vrucht heeft een gladde bolster die in het begin nog kort, klierachtig behaard is. De lichtbruine noot is gegroefd. Bijzonder smakelijk. Noten verschijnen pas bij circa 15 jarige exemplaren. Wortelt zeer diep en heeft liefst goed doorwortelbare, open grond. Belangrijke houtproducent.

Cultivated for many centuries and growing into a substantial tree of about 8-12 m in height. The almost round crown is composed of heavy branches. The old trunk is light grey with deep, irregular vertical grooves. The odd-pinnate leaves grow to 20 - 30 cm long and have 2 - 4 (6) yokes. The partial leaves are ovate to oval, about 8 - 12 cm. After leaf development, the green, male catkins (circa 7 cm) and the smaller female flowers appear, arranged in groups of 2 or 3 together. The green, almost round, fruit has a smooth husk that is initially still short, glandularly hairy. The light brown nut is grooved. Particularly tasty. Nuts do not appear until around 15 years old. Roots very deeply and prefers well-rooted, open soil. Important timber producer.
