




## Populus ×canescens 'Honthorpa'



<b>Height</b>	20-25 m
<b>Width</b>	15-20m
<b>Crown</b>	narrow conical, half-open crown
<b>Bark and branches</b>	grey
<b>Leaf</b>	green
<b>Flowers</b>	grey, flowers in March
<b>Fruits</b>	fruitless cultivar
<b>Spines/thorns</b>	None
<b>Toxicity</b>	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
<b>Soil type</b>	clayed soil, loamy soil, sandy soil, acid soil, calcareous soil
<b>Soil moisture</b>	suitable for wet soil
<b>Paving</b>	tolerates paving
<b>Winter hardiness zone</b>	5a (-28,8 to -26,1 °C)
<b>Wind resistance</b>	good
<b>Other resistances</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind, resistant to de-icing salt
<b>Application</b>	coastal areas

The trunk grows more or less straight and forms a narrow pyramidal crown when young. At a later stage it becomes broader. The bark is grey. The dark green leaves are triangular to ovoid and have a grey underside. They are lobed and turn yellowish-green in the autumn. 'Honthorpa' is little sensitive to rust but is certainly sensitive to canker. Can be used in landscapes and for row planting and as a solitary in parks and public gardens. It shows good resistance to wind. Winter hardiness zone: 5a
